

Report of events

Walks – This years Society walks seem a long while ago – occurring back in June.

Around 30 walkers enjoyed the Day Walk on Mon 1st June on a very warm day. With our summers weather being "one hot one day and wet the next", Richard obviously got it right on that day with a start point at Hardy's monument.

The **Évening Walk** on **Wed 17th June** was not quite so successful with the weather. However, around 17 walkers enjoyed a damp evening walk starting and ending at The Saxon Arms in Stratton.

Cream Teas – Maureen Tepper co-ordinated this years well attended Cream Teas on 25th July. The sun shone brightly on the orchard and the 100 scones that were provided all went. The only complaint heard was that the cream teas ended before the conversations had finished.

Scarecrow competition – This competition ran for the two weeks before the Vegetable show and, once more, had a very good entry from all over the village. It was unfortunately, that with so many good figures, we had to have a winner. The witch in the garden at Corner Cottage worked her magic and scared all the crows in area whilst being awarded the first

prize. All entrants are to be congratulated for some great figures and inciting much interest from visitors (and residents).

Vegetable Show – The village fun vegetable show produced another large entry into the spud in the tub class. Several children dug the spuds from many tubs for the judges with a harvest ranging from ½ Oz (how does he do it?) to over 4 lbs (how did he do it?) produced by John Allen - this years winner. Certificates were awarded to the winners in all the other categories with one young man seen walking home with four certificates.

As last year, after a small donation to Scutt Hall, all revenue raised was donated to the Waves Charity in Weymouth run by The Childrens Society. This year, John Crisp was able to send a cheque for £300.

BBQ Evening The village BBQ evening managed to be held in the orchard in spite of threatening poorer (or should it be pourer) weather earlier in the day. A most enjoyable time was had by all who attended and they look forward to next years event.

- Heritage and History Bill Egerton leads the group that has started documenting the history of dwellings, and changes in the village.
- Crime prevention Peter Jones co-ordinates the Homewatch activities for the village. Local village coordinators distribute messages received from the Dorset Homewatch team.
- Conservation Your Committee continue to examine and comment on all local planning applications. Note that all other interested parties also need to comment.
- A document, outlining the principles followed by your committee in their approach to Planning in Sutton Poyntz, is posted on the notice board for your information.
- . The Village Map project continues. Work on the Map (Interpretation Panel) is being undertaken by Tony Heathershaw, Mike Nixon and Peter and Louise
- **Tourist leaflet** A leaflet highlighting the features to be found in a walk around the village is also progressing with drafts produced and estimates being prepared. A grant has been obtained from Wessex Watermark towards the publishing and printing costs and it is hoped that copies will soon be available keep an eye on the Notice boards.
- Biodiversity Group News John Newbould reports - Since the last Newsletter, members of the group and local residents have continued to collect information on the area's nature. The warm June was a splendid month for moth trapping, which we did both in our gardens and at the waterworks. July has not fulfilled its potential in part due to the bad weather and also due to our generator needing servicing. We have recently received a number of reports of the migrant



Jersey Tiger moth both in our traps and casual records in daylight. This moth is a candidate CITES species for protection with the coastal fringes of Dorset collecting a few UK records. We have surveyed the operational area of the waterworks in July and started to assess the

breeding success of Linnet on the hill. However, the Dartford Warbler does not seem to be around. Regular walks on Monday mornings start from Fox Cottage at 9.30am for around 2 hours. All are welcome regardless of experience.

- Planning Matters Your committee has revised the process for reviewing planning applications to include all members of the committee instead of a small sub group as previously implemented.
- Objected Objection submitted into appeal process for another house behind Fuschia cottage
 - Commented Peverill garage and Porch
- Trees at Clyffe cottage and Springside restated view of Society but deferred decision to Trees officer.
- Tree at Fuschia cottage expressed concern that any pruning did not damage the tree.
- Communications mast on Chalbury hill asked why the existing two masts could not be used.
- · Your committee has initiated enquiries as to the possibility of implementing a 20 MPH speed limit throughout the village from the top of Plaisters to the village entrance at Sutton Road. It appears the start and end of the limit might need to be marked with something like a rumble strip to indicate the lower limits. Our local councillors are investigating.
