## PLANNING

No 1 Myrtle Cottages – The revised Planning Application (12/00604) was approved by the Council; the Society's response was the only one opposing the changes.

Trees – The tree surgeons are going to be busy – there have been a host of applications for tree felling or maintenance. The Society's view is that the trees in and around the village are important for the village's character, and the stock of trees should not be reduced.

## COMING EVENTS

**Wine tasting evening** – The Society is running a wine tasting evening on the 23<sup>rd</sup> January, in the Mission Hall. Jack de Carteret will bring along samples of different wine types, and will try to help people in their understanding and appreciation of wine, but mainly just in their enjoyment of wine.
