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A very Fayre day indeed

Blessed with marvellous weather, large crowds and tremendous support from everyone in and around the village, this was a Fayre day that will live long in the memory. It even started with a bang, courtesy of the Nothe Fort gun. Car parking was in the safe hands of Spam, and the huge number of villagers in Victorian costume added greatly to the atmosphere (as you can see from the village wenches and the squire with his manservant).



Wherever you turned there was something to interest, to amaze and to delight. The stage entertainment at the two venues was varied but always first class, as was the separate area for the children, with rides, toy stalls and a Punch and Judy man. The village bread stall - with enough to feed the 5,000, or so it seemed - made a profit of over £560! There were nine village stalls, including Perfect Presents, Designer Clothes, Plants and Antiques & Bygones. The new Pimms in the Garden venue was full to overflowing, and a call went out for extra volunteers to meet the demand. The refreshments in the Mission Hall and the Waterworks were equally well patronised, as the heat caused a need for tea (or something stronger at the Springhead). The Wessex Water Museum received complimentary remarks, and the BBQ eased many hunger pangs. Although it was on for just one day, the planning and preparation in the days/weeks before, plus the clearing up afterwards, made it more of a marathon than a sprint. Dave Langridge, Fayre Chairman, praised the community spirit of the village which made his job so much easier, and he was proud to announce that £16,000 had been raised, mainly for the DCH Cancer Appeal. Well done everyone.

Sutton Poyntz illustrated talk and walk

Jez Cunningham reports that the Mission Hall was crowded for this meeting organised by The South Dorset Ridgeway Partnership. The project was introduced by James Sharpe (Project Manager) ably assisted by Steph, and he passed the floor to Steve Wallis, senior archaeologist at Dorset County Council who talked on the archaeology of the area, with particular emphasis on the huge number of ancient burial sites. The audience then joined Kim Sankey - Historic Buildings Architect - for a walk around some of the notable parts of the village. They followed Mission Hall Lane and down Plaisters Lane, admiring stonework and thatch as we passed, then along Puddledock Lane to Cornhill Way to look at Sutton Lodge and Sutton House. In Sutton Road we studied Hunt's Cottage, then the Mill, the Courthouse and Northdown Farmhouse. Walking through to Silver Street they located the water standpipe, where it was mentioned that the project has a little funding which could assist in bringing some history back to life. They continued up past the pond, studying the cottages and then in White Horse Lane paused at Cob Cottage, one of the four beautiful Wamsley Lewis designed houses in the village. The walk concluded with a fascinating look around the Waterworks, led by John Willows.

Go Karting!

Loop Walsh organised a SPAM afternoon of go-karting at the Clay Pigeon Raceway, but on learning that Joyce Peel, President of the SP Women's Institute, was a keen Formula 1 racing fan, he extended the invitation to her and the WI. In September this year a business case will be presented to the Home Office for a merger between the Dorset and Devon and Cornwall Police Forces. This will only take place if the Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) of both forces are convinced that the majority of their county residents are in agreement with the amalgamation. The Dorset PCC is holding a series of presentations on the plans, but none are in the Weymouth area, so Peter Jones has been in contact to ask if this can be rectified.
