Garden Wildlife

Thank you to all who returned the bird recording sheets. Once again, I am running slightly behind due to trips away.

The autumn migration continuing apace, interestingly we are not seeing the number of Swallows and House Martin flocks of past years. One of the mysteries of the migration process is why birds choose a particular route. Last week a small party of us visited the coast to see migrating birds. We hardly saw a Swallow or House Martin all day, but a friend ringed over 1300 Swallows in East Sussex.

Good numbers of Yellow Wagtail have been seen at Lodmoor, whilst there is also an inward migration of some birds, e.g. Starling where numbers have built up at Bowleeze to around 100.

Harvest time also seems good for the Canada Geese with 370 flying east over Preston at 7.15am on 20 September.

Ferns on walls

Walking round the village, I often notice plants including ferns growing on garden walls. Invariably, these are old walls built prior to the Second World War using a lime-based cement, not the modern material. This fern seen just off Sutton Road is Rusty-back Fern Ceterach officinarum. Although not uncommon in Dorset, it is mainly found in the northwest of the County. Other ferns seen on walls in the village include Black Spleenwort, Wall-rue and Harts-tongue Fern.
