## **Garden Bird Watch**

With 22 reports to hand, it is possible to get a picture of the early winter garden bird life in the village. There has been just one report of Fieldfare and Redwing during the survey with four reports of Song Thrush and one of Mistle Thrush at Bellamy Cottage. Blackbirds have been seen in every garden often ground feeding, but many berried cotoneasters are becoming stripped and there is little sign of berries left on hawthorn.

with two gardens having lists of 26 birds. Grey Wagtail appears on the list together with single reports of Blackcap, Chiffchaff, Siskin and Brambling. There have been a number of reports of Sparrowhawk, whether this is one bird or more around. A neighbour brought Janet Craig a dead Water Rail found near the waterworks. It did not appear injured.

At the National Biodiversity Trust annual conference held on 23rd November 2012, at the Royal Society, London; John was awarded Honorary Membership of the NBN Trust by the Trust's Chairman Professor Michael Hassell.
