A few planning applications have been submitted to the Council since the last Newsletter, including a footpath diversion, two dwellings and the renewal of a thatched roof. Construction of the houses in Sutton House grounds nears completion.

Like many individuals, the Society was concerned at the possibility of dwellings being build on land at the end of Old Bincombe Lane. Our views were firmly expressed to the Council, to local councillors and to amenity societies. At the time of writing this, no planning application appears to have been made to the local authority. Everyone may be assured that if and when developments occur the matter will receive urgent attention.

Wasn't it nice to see the great improvement in the appearance of the River Jordan between No 85 Sutton Road and Puddledock Lane? This was carried out by Charles Dale, new owner of the bungalow. Well done. Could be a useful precedent?!!

Over 900 years ago William the Conqueror's land survey resulted in the Domesday Book. We understand the B.B.C. has invited schools to take part in compiling a 1985 Domesday record, designed to preserve details of the country at the present time. Mr Miles, deputy head of St John's School at Weymouth and responsible for areas on the North and East of the borough, sought information from the Society about the village generally and from Miss Elizabeth Saunders about farming interests. We are assured of a fair share of space in the new record.
