Planning

Proposed development at the Sutton Poyntz Riding Stables (i.e. conversion of the barn and erection of two dwellings on the site of the actual stables) was discussed on 25 April by the Committee and eleven members of the Society from around the Stables with a representative of the firm who submitted the plans to the Council. As a result, the Society wrote to the Chief Planning Officer emphasising the importance of the design and siting of the dwellings and their effect on the street scene and amenities generally. The advice of an architect, Mr Roy Fewtrell, was also obtained. He made most helpful comments on details of design, materials, layout of the intended courtyard and so on, and the Society submitted further comments to the Council.

While most people would naturally prefer to see the Stables continue in use as a very pleasant and acceptable rural pursuit, we have to accept that for one reason or another this seems no longer feasible. What is therefore important is to get the development right, bearing in mind its impact on this crucial part of the village and any precedent which may be created. Equally important is to endeavour to prevent more development behind the Stables site. It was in fact to achieve this objective that, as the Chief Planning Officer of the Council told our annual meeting last year, the boundary of the development area in the Structure Plan was moved back. Although revised boundaries in the borough have not yet been formally approved, applications for development in line with the revisions are being considered - which strikes many people as odd, to say the least.

Mr Peter Diment's plans for development at his farm in Puddledock Lane, referred to in the last Newsletter, were not approved by the Council and it is understood that an appeal against the decision has been lodged with the Department of the Environment.

Litter
