PLANNING

There's really no need to mention the main activity of the last few weeks. Demolition of the Riding Stables and construction on the site of three dwellings, approved by the Borough Council, will have completely changed the village scene. Many months have, however, elapsed since proposals by the Council for some realignment of the development boundary and by an agency on behalf of a developer were discussed with the Society at open meetings. Past Newsletters have contained information on the situation at the Stables - even when there has not been too much to report.

Recent applications to the local authority for planning permission for development in the village have been noted by the Society's Committee without comment. But they were not happy about one proposal to erect a fairly long side fence more than 5 metres high - they felt such a structure could become physically dangerous andwould, if approved, create an unwelcome precedent.
