#### Report of events


The Action Plan groupings and current progress are summarised below:

- Communication Newsletters continue to be delivered to Members and posted on the Notice Board.
- Heritage and History Bill Egerton is looking at documenting the history of dwellings and changes in the village.
- Childrens Facilities no action.
- Crime prevention (P Jones) The visit of the Community Van is noted above. Households will have received a copy of the Safer Dorset handbook from the Dorset Police Authority. In addition the Home Office have made available a document entitled Home Security (an introduction to domestic surveying). The latter document is slanted more towards advisors on home security and the Homewatch volunteers are not qualified to approach home security from that standpoint. There are, however, some very good practical tips and advice contained within its pages. Copies are available from your Homewatch co-ordinator or from Peter Jones (01305-833288).
- Conservation Your Committee continue to examine all local planning applications. Note all interested parties also need to comment.
- Footpaths Tony Heathershaw is investigating possible funding for a village map. Our request for funds through the Pride of Place competition to obtain artist assistance in generating local maps / walks was unsuccessful; it was won by Lyme Regis for a Turning Lyme Green project. Your committee is in correspondence with W&PBC to attempt to improve the condition of Footpath 18 (between Weymouth Bay and Waterside caravan sites).
- Wildlife and Environment David Emery / John Newbould running a study – progress was exhibited at the October Coffee Morning.
- Traffic A notice has been posted by W&PBC, detailing a proposal to restrict parking on a short length of Sutton Road.

#### Matters discussed by your committee

Appearance of the village – We have advised W&PBC of the dead trees along Sutton Road.

We have been concerned with the proliferation of signs in the village





- Opposed Building of equipment store in the green area between Puddledock Lane and Sutton Road. Since been rejected.
  - Additional house in White Horse Lane has been rejected.
- Building of equipment store along footpath 18 in Weymouth Bay Caravan Park - has been rejected.
- Planning Appeals Waterside Caravan Park expansion (to which the Society objected) appeal started October 7<sup>th</sup> in the Ocean Room. The decision from the inspector is expected in the next few weeks.
  - Pair of dwellings replacing the Cart Shed, which was rejected, has gone to written appeal.
- Commented on alteration at 1 Sutton Close since been rejected.
- Noted Parking restrictions proposed along Sutton Road.
- SHLAA A document "Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment" has been published by W&PBC and is available on their web site. It is the first stage of the process to identify land for potential future building sites to meet the Government requirements for new houses over the next 15 years.

Correspondence – The Society has received correspondence from Mr Skinner who has objected to a report of items discussed by your committee in the November 2006 Newsletter relating to the car park area at the northern end of the pond. He has expressed the opinion that some of the factual information considered by the committee at its meeting in October 2006 was inaccurate.

**Buses** – Our thanks to First buses who have maintained a near normal service to the village over the last few months – in spite of difficulties at times in negotiating Sutton Road.
