PLANNING

No 1 Myrtle Cottages – Your committee continues to consult with the Planning Office over those details of the construction that do not match the original planning application. A revised Planning Application (12/00604) has recently been submitted, and we are considering our response.

Littlecot – The Weymouth and Portland Planning Committee approved this application, although against the advice of the Planning Officer. The Society will remind the Chairman of the Planning Committee that we have previously asked that when such decisions are made, the minutes of the meeting should record the reasons given for the Planning Committee overruling the advice of the employed Planning Officer.

The committee is inviting the Planning Committee Chairman to visit the village, so that we can discuss which developments genuinely "preserve and enhance" the Conservation Area, and help one another to an understanding of best practice.
