Bus bombshell

Whilst elsewhere in this newsletter you will find news on attempts to open up the byway tracks above the village to motorised vehicles, on the roads below the First Bus Company seem intent on REDUCING the number of their vehicles. They have made an application to completely withdraw the 4B service to Sutton Poyntz. These changes are not only a huge blow to the many elderly - and not so elderly! - people living in Sutton Poyntz, but also to holidaymakers who have a long walk, often with their luggage, up the hill past the Spice Ship to the Seaview Holiday Park. The 4B route is not subsidised by the Council but difficulties of reversing buses into Old Bincombe Lane is one reason given for the change. It's odd that green methods of travelling such as cycling are supported, whereas equally green bus services are being curtailed. 
Getting a taste for it?

The Mission Hall was packed for the Wine Tasting evening. Bill Egerton introduced 'mine host' for the evening, well known local resident Jack de Carteret, who had worked for Eldridge Pope, and in 1964 became a Master of Wine, one of only 300 worldwide. Laura Jewell, the Chief Wine Buyer for Tescos is one of the relatively few women in this select group.

A Master of Wine is someone who has demonstrated, by way of rigorous examination involving both the blind tasting of wine and written theory papers, a thorough knowledge of all aspects of wine and an ability to communicate that knowledge clearly. They actively encourage others in the pursuit of knowledge as well as seeking to bring wine communities together. Jack had selected six types of wine for the evening, and after a (small) quantity of each was tasted the audience were invited to give their opinion and an estimate of the cost. I enjoyed the wine and Jack's interesting analysis of each, but have to confess that my palate is not as well developed as I might have hoped. However I will keep trying! The evening concluded with a vote of appreciation for Jack's expert knowledge and much friendly discussion about what had been learnt over, of course, a glass of wine!

Push the BOAT out!

The Sutton Poyntz Society held a meeting in the Mission Hall to discuss applications to upgrade bridleways BR1 Bincombe to Came Down Golf Course, BRs11, 24 and 5 across the top of the White Horse via Pixon Barn to the A353 just south of Poxwell and BR26 from the bottom of Osmington to the top of White Horse Hill to Byways Open to all Traffic (BOAT) for use by off-road vehicles including motorcycles. There was an excellent turnout on a very cold night to hear Bill Egerton outline the proposed changes, which if approved would open up a long length of track to motorised transport. He made it clear that objections on H&S grounds, damage to the environment, noise etc were not valid.



The application would stand or fall on whether it was established that the track had been used by motor vehicles between 1985 and 2005 without hindrance.

By a show of hands the meeting demonstrated that it was unanimously against the applications and wished to preserve the tracks as bridleways. Anyone who had evidence that the tracks had little or no motorised use in the 25 year period was urged to write to the DCC Rights of Way Officer.
