Planning Applications

WP/TP/14/00141: Tree at Sutton House - already approved.

WP/CA/15/00008: Fell 6 trees at Greendown House. The application does not contain any form of justification for the proposed felling, and a Supporting Document belonging to a different planning application is attached! The Council have been contacted about these errors, and as the Planning Application approval for the new house included conditions relating to tree conservation, the Society will submit a representation strongly opposing this application.

The car park has landed!

A public meeting was called at the Mission Hall just before Christmas to discuss the small piece of land known as the 'Springhead Car Park' at the top of the pond. John Crisp, John Sutherland and Bill Egerton explained to a large audience that after much investigation over nearly a decade, it transpired that the owner of the land was neither any individual resident, WPBC, WDDC, nor Punch Taverns but in fact it belonged to Devenish Brewery Ltd. They were happy to sell it for a nominal sum to Sutton Poyntz Ltd (SPL), a company set up because the SP Society cannot legally hold land. After the sale, Title Absolute had been awarded to SPL by the Land Registry. John Crisp proposed a vote of thanks to those in the Society who had worked so hard and so long to bring the process to a satisfactory conclusion, which was greeted with warm and sustained applause. There was some discussion about possible uses for the land, but the first imperative was to give it something of a facelift, and in the first weeks of the new year this has been effected. The directors of SPL are now busy establishing the best way forward, but rest assured that all actions taken will be for the benefit of the village and its inhabitants.

Take 100 lines!

Industry power regulator Ofgem has funding available to allow electricity companies to replace overhead electricity lines with underground cables in areas where sensitive

landscapes would benefit. One area under consideration is the view from the top of Coombe Valley road, where the pylons and lines blight the beautiful view out to sea. (Thanks to John Morris for the 'amended' picture) The Society has registered an interest in removing the pylons and lines, and is seeking support from surrounding village societies and from our local MP. A public exhibition has been organised by National Grid and the Dorset AONB, at the Colliton Club, Dorchester from 2 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday 18 February, so drop in and make your opinions known.
