gardens - which were looking at their very best - and they also enjoyed the Art Exhibition, refreshments and various stalls assembled in the Mission Hall. Visitors were

extremely complimentar y about the

whole event and those who had never visited the village were very impressed with its charm and beauty. In total £6,000 was raised to share between Cancer Research UK (75%) and

Planning Applications

WP/15/00308/FUL: Development of 8 houses on land at 42 Sutton Road. The Society is concerned at the high density of the proposed housing, the small garden size, the assumption that on-street parking would be available and the impact of this latter on access along Sutton Road. These concerns have been made known to the Council.

WP/15/00081/FUL & WP/15/00088/FUL: 15 houses in total on the field off Plaisters Lane. The Society opposed the first application on the basis that it offended against 5 of the 7 Society planning policies and in particular would do visual damage to the Conservation Area and the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. These comments applied equally to the revised application that was tabled. The matter is unlikely to be considered by the Planning Committee before August at the earliest.

Margaret's Seat

As you probably know, the replacement stone for Margaret's seat has been prepared by Albion Stone after a very generous donation towards



the cost by Dorset County Council. A number of sturdy diggers plus one equally sturdy dog (tail just visible) have prepared the foundations by excavating a large hole

for the cement base, and thanks are due to them for their

efforts. When the stone is delivered, local farmer Peter Broach has kindly agreed to transport it to the actual site where it will be mortared onto the foundations. The official



unveiling will take place on Sunday 9 August, with Mick Hobson, Margaret's husband, and daughter Kathryn in attendance.

Volunteer Grass Cutters Needed

The lovely old orchard behind the Mission Hall requires regular mowing to keep it useable for events. SP Residents visit the big city

Simon Grant Jones, our village blacksmith - that phrase has a nice ring to it! - is both an Associate and a Licentiate of the Worshipful Company of Blacksmiths The latter means that he is qualified to teach the craft, and he is one of only twelve such teachers in the Company. He achieved the qualification over 16 years ago, after meeting the rigorous standards required, which included an assessor visiting Dorset to watch him in action and the submission of much documentary evidence of his ability to the Wardens' Court, a year long process. Although a professional Blacksmith specialising in beautiful bespoke forged metalwork - he was UK National Champion Blacksmith for 2010 and again for 2012 - I suspect from the way that he described his work that teaching comes high on the list of his loves and priorities. He regularly attends Guild dinners in London, especially the Awards dinner in November each year, but earlier this year came a special occasion. He and wife Lyn were invited by Lord Wakeham, with 38 others from the Guild, to lunch at the House of Lords at the palace of Westminster!

To celebrate the centenary of the Women's Institute a Garden Party was held at Buckingham Palace, hosted by The Duchess of Cornwall. Also in attendance were Princess Alexandra, The Countess of Wessex, and The Duchess of Gloucester.
