Could you be an Angel?

We should all be keeping an eve out for difficulties that our neighbours may be experiencing, and helping where we can. One marvellous local organisation which does this, and a good port of call if help is needed, is the Community Angels. This idea was 'conceived' in 2009 when the Church realised it could not visit all those it knew to be in need. A franchise Manchester scheme investigated by Rev Tim West was financially impractical, but following discussions, the possibility of starting an independent St Andrews alternative was suggested. After a meeting of parishioners and the local Women's Institutes on a snowy February afternoon in 2009, with finance from anonymous parishioners and funding from the Co-op Local Community Fund, enough volunteers came forward to start the scheme. A registered charity, it is administered by St Andrew's Church with assistance from Preston Road Doctors' Surgery. Its aim is to provide a free support service for the people of Littlemoor, Osmington, Overcombe, Preston, Poxwell and Sutton Poyntz. All Community Angels volunteers are interviewed, supervised, police checked, insured and carry an identification badge. They attend regular training sessions and strictly respect confidentiality unless someone is at risk. There are currently 50 volunteers (but they could always do with more!) who undertake a variety of tasks befriending, shopping, small errands, transport, accompanied walks, help with correspondence, gardening, companionship and dog walking. Last year they made over 3000 visits, went along on 250 accompanied trips to hospitals/doctors, hosted 100 Welcome Clubs and tea parties, served 400 lunches at their lunch club, made countless shopping errands and walked over 500 dogs! Perhaps a couple of quotes can sum up what has been achieved: - from a Neighbour " I woke up this morning feeling sad but then I remembered the Angels were coming and I began to smile" and from an Angel "I spend time with a Neighbour and they enjoy it, but so do I. There is definitely a 'feel good' factor in being an Angel."

Or perhaps YOU are an Angel in disguise or could help their work with a donation? Remember - YOUR neighbours need YOU.

Mo Martin has suggested that the bench adjacent to the phone box should be made more accessible. A number of elderly people like to use it while out walking (personally I use the bus stop bench. But I digress). In the past cars have sometimes blocked access, but this might cease if the bench was spruced up. This



could be achieved by cleaning, treating or replacing the wood and clearing away the overgrown foliage. Perhaps it might even be moved forward a foot or two? Jez thinks that peripheral visual distractions (his words; I'm not sure I fully understand them) act as traffic calming measures so with the seat and phone box more obvious, traffic may slow down a bit. The history of who installed the bench is obscure - do you know anything about it? - but people are willing to help; they just need someone to organise them. Could this be you? If you can spare a little time, let me know.

marvellous event, and all those who worked so hard to make it successful deserve a big thank you.


Village Vegetable Show
