

MINUTES

of the 1994 A.G.M. held on 12 April 1994 at 7.30 pm.  
in the Scott Hall, Sutton Road. Mr Tony Bugler in the chair  
and 53 members present. Several apologies were received.

1. Minutes of 1993 A.G.M. were read, approved and signed.

2. Matters arising - nil, apart from those mentioned by the Chairman.

3. Chairman's report.

The Bugler said we had had a successful and enjoyable year, with ample co-operation among villagers, the Society and organisations. Among the matters referred to were :-

- (a) Britain-in-Bloom. Success in 1993 and hopefully good colour this year. Daffodils had been planted, along with a tree at the Sutton/Repton junction. The pub and bandstand wagon were attractive. Photos have been taken of the village in winter and spring in readiness for the 1994 entry.
- (b) The Mill House and White Horse cottage renovations
- (c) Development at Northdown Farm and negotiations over footpaths.
- (d) Action taken over the winter flooding.
- (e) "Open Day" at the Waterside excavations and possible talk in due course in conjunction with the W.I.
- (f) The Village Fayre, with which we are co-operating.
- (g) Replacement of Don Rabone's show case
- (h) Support for the Dorset County Museum in any l.g. reorganisation
- (i) The ducks, and duck-house occasion
- (j) Support for the Civic Society's exhibition etc
- (k) On planning -
  - (i) Meeting convened by W.P.B.C. in November to discuss the revised local plan, including the "Brown Route"
  - (ii) Representation about illegal caravans in the Jordan valley
  - (iii) Representation about Dartpath 26 diversion - inspectors report awaited.

- (iv) On the 'Brown Route' (relief road proposals) - reference to the latest proposals and the effect on the Littleton area; a four-lane highway costing £25 million seemed unnecessary and would cause damage to the environment, including Ledmore SSI and the Ridgeway. The Committee had consistently been against this route.
- (c) Social activities, including the walk by Langton Herring, cream teas, talks by Richard Ackewell and Ronnie Waite. A quiz night will take place in May.

On the motion of Mrs Lipschitz, duly seconded, it was resolved (a) that Mr Bugler be thanked for his report and (b) that this A.G.M. supports the Committee's representations against the Brown route and considers the whole question of the relief roads should be referred to a public inquiry.

4. Secretary's report.

The Knight referred to a Thanksgiving Service agreed by the Joseph Wild Hafod committee on 31.5.94 at St Mary's church, Dorchester, to which all were invited; and to the usual Beach Clean-up on 24.4.94.

5. Treasurer's report.

The Gauben presented the audited accounts for 1993-4. He said that the Committee had purposely spent more money than normal, including on Britain-in-Bloom, the kil and duck house and duck food. £200 was loaned to the Village Faire Committee and will of course be repaid.

On the motion of Mr <sup>Foxon</sup> Hobson, duly seconded, the Treasurer's report was accepted and it was agreed that subscriptions for the ensuing year remain unchanged.

6. Committee Membership

The Secretary said that the secret Newsletter invited nominations but none had been received. The existing members were willing

to serve again on the motion of Mrs Stephen, duly seconded,  
it was agreed that the present members be re-elected for this year.

### 1. Other business

- (i) The Pond. Mr Litsclie mentioned that the pond was often dirty. It was agreed that the attention of Wexford Water be drawn to this; one reason might be an abundance of chalk etc due to more ploughing of local land.
- (ii) The seat at Telegraph Hill. Replying to a question, the Chairman said that Wexford Water still have provision in mind, possibly when the building work for the new plant is completed.
- (iii) Cars in the village. Several members mentioned the problem of parked cars in the area of the fork junction and Old Bincorke Lane. Some suggested that cars awaiting attention at the bashed caused difficulty; others mentioned growing private parking. Mr Pressley said that unless cars are parked illegally it might be difficult to take action, and the Chairman thought that individuals could when necessary contact the local authority or the police. It was agreed that the committee consider the matter.
- (iv) Mr Hayles Cottage. Reference was made to the thatch on Springfield cottage being replaced by tiles. Mr Gubbin said that the cottage is not "listed" and the local authority could not insist on replacement by thatch. The Secretary said that Mr. Hayles had gone into the matter carefully with authorities concerned.
- (v) Flower planting. Mr Finch hoped some snowdrops might be planted in suitable places by the Society.

After coffee + biscuits had been served, the Sutton Royston Players presented a mystery thriller (set in the 1790's) called The Black Ring, produced by Simon Gubbin. It was received with acclamation.
