

MINUTES

of the A.G.M. held in the Sutton Room on 16 April 1996 at 7.0pm.  
Tony Bugler in the chair and 48 members present. Several apologies  
announced. [The SLS banner, 8-in-8 cap and certificates, and SLS scrap books were  
displayed.]

1. Minutes of the A.G.M. on 4.4.95 were read, approved and signed.
2. Matters arising - taken up under item 3.
3. Chairman's report.

The Chairman referred to the past year having been busy and successful generally, with some notable achievements, among them winning a cap in the Britain-in-Bloom campaign, several talks and social events and two awards by the Weymouth Civic Society (the waterworks development and Northdown Tower conversions). The Chairman also referred to the festive treatment of the pond islands, the Sutton Rd. footpath, Christmas coffee and mince pies, the Kermesse in March, the vandalism of and repairs to the post-box, consideration of the Green Route (including the ministerial inquiry) and structure plans, the Millennium Seal, a car boot sale, highly successful Cream Tea in Old Town Hall, and possible redevelopment of Sutton Room by Loderact in liaison with St. Andrews Church, and the poop scoop bin.

In reply to questions, the Chairman mentioned the present position

with regard to the possible development at Greenhill Barton and possible provision of traffic calming measures in Plaisterers Lane. After some further discussion, the Chairman's report was received, with thanks for all his work for the Society (moved by Shirley Meach, duly seconded).

#### 4. Chairman's Report.

Mr Trubka presented the audited accounts for the year ending 31.3.76 and answered a few questions. There was £2120.96 (plus several months' interest) in the Nat. Savings Ac and £475.32 in the bank or petty cash. On the motion of Fredy Littoori, duly seconded, the accounts were approved and subscriptions fixed again at £2 per household, £1 for persons alone.

#### 5. Secretary's report.

Mr Knight said that committee attendance remained high - four members having attended all 11 meetings, which had been held, as in the past, in members' houses. We appreciated their hospitality.

#### 6. Committee Membership.

All existing members, except Oliver Brown, were willing to serve again; Oliver had other commitments and difficulties, and he was thanked for his services over several years. Nominations for Vice Chairman Gates and Mr Jim Brierley had been received. On the motion of Aviv Buch, duly seconded, these members were elected en bloc for the coming year.

#### 7. A.O.B.

- (i) There was brief discussion about the current widening of part of Preston Road southwards from Chalbury Corner, traffic flows, and Margaret Brown's care of some local churches.
- (ii) The Chairman said that Ken Knight would remain on the Committee but wished to relinquish secretarialship after 13 years. He was thanked for his past services and Tony Buglow, our

behalf of the Committee, presented him with a picture of old Maymester, for which Len Knight gratefully thanked the members.

At 7.45 pm. Mr Christopher Lope, Chairman of Eldridge Lope p.l.c. of Dunchurch, spoke about wine production and produced samples of 12 wines from various countries which members sampled. The Chairman referred to the Lope family's connection with Sultan Sogatz, and Mr Lope mentioned his recent munitions client with (among others) Richard Backwell. Everyone joined in enthusiastic applause for Mr. Lope.  
(Note: the wines cost £138.00 but £41.00 was raised by selling off what it is not drunk). The meeting closed about 9.30 pm.
