

## References - Chaundos

Here is a list of references to Sir Roger de Chaundos and his wife Matilda (or Maud). [Sutton Poyntz](#) was among the properties granted to Matilda as dowry when she married Roger de Chaundos; they held Sutton Poyntz between about 1315 and 1361 (when Matilda died).

Roger was a member of a Hereford family. He held various offices, including sheriff of Hereford and sheriff of Glamorgan, and seems to have served the king in various capacities in South Wales. Matilda was born Matilda d'Acton, at Iron Acton in Gloucestershire. Her first husband was [Nicholas Poyntz](#); Nicholas had been married before, and already had two sons, but Matilda bore Nicholas another son, John, who later inherited the manor of Iron Acton. She also bore at least one son to Roger Chaundos. This son was an ancestor (via a female line) of the Dukes of Buckingham and Chandos.

The entries are in date order, so far as is possible; where we have amalgamated a series of entries, we have placed them at the date of the first entry in the series. We have omitted or abbreviated the text for entries that are not particularly relevant to Sutton Poyntz, including orders sent to Roger de Chaundos as sheriff of Hereford and in other official capacities. Actual quotes are in italics.

The description of John Newburgh as "senior" makes it almost certain that this dates to 1428 (16 Hen V). The document itself is not clear.  This references the agreement dated 1330 (see above), whereby the manors of Sutton Poyntz and Rockley in Wiltshire are granted eventually to the next heir of Hugh Poyntz. At this stage, Hugh and his son Nicholas have both died. The writ concludes that the manor of Sutton Poyntz should therefore go to Nicholas's grandson John Newburgh.
